# The Dialectics of Dependency

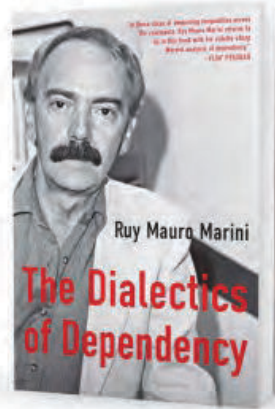
Considered one of the most important intellectuals in Latin American social thought, Ruy Mauro Marini demonstrated that underdevelopment and development are the result of relations between economies in the world market and the class relations they engender. Marini showed that, as Latin America came to specialize in the production of raw materials and foodstuffs while importing manufactured goods, a process of unequal exchange took shape that created a transfer of value to the imperialist centers. This encouraged capitalists in the periphery to resort to the superexploitation of workers—harsh working conditions where wages fall below what is needed to reproduce their labor power. In this way, the economies of Latin America, which played a fundamental role in facilitating a new phase of the industrial revolution in Western Europe, passed from the colonial condition only to be rendered economically “dependent” on, or subordinated to, imperialist economies.

Written during an upsurge of class struggle in the region in the 1970s, this is the first authorized publication in English.

**RUY MAURO MARINI** (1932–1997) was one of the originators of Marxist dependency theory. As a result of his activism, the Brazilian sociologist and revolutionary was forced into two decades of bitter exile in Chile and Mexico—and in the process introduced such concepts as “superexploitation” and “subimperialism” to the revolutionary lexicon.

**AMANDA LATIMER** is a senior lecturer in Politics and international relations at Kingston University, UK. **JAIME OSORIO** is a Chilean social scientist and former colleague of Marini who has resided in Mexico since the military coup of Augusto Pinochet.

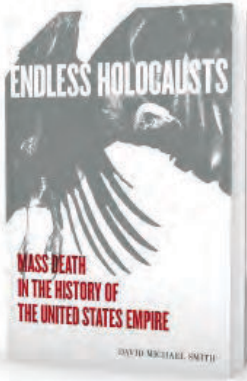

The rise of the U.S. Empire has relied upon an almost unimaginable loss of life, from its inception during the European colonial period, to the present. In *Endless Holocausts*, Smith demolishes the myth of exceptionalism by demonstrating that manifold forms of mass death, far from being unfortunate exceptions to an otherwise benign historical record, have been indispensable in the rise of the wealthiest and most powerful imperium in the history of the world. At the same time, Smith points to an extraordinary history of resistance by Indigenous peoples, people of African descent, people in other nations brutalized by U.S. imperialism, workers, and democratic-minded people around the world determined to fight for common dignity and for the sake of the greater good.

# The Fault in Our SARS

COVID-19 in the Biden Era

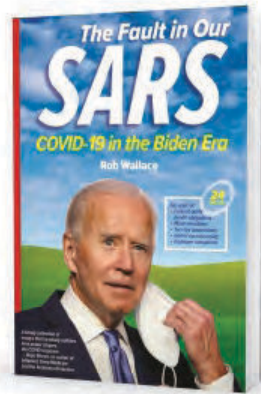
The Trump administration's neglect and incompetence helped put half a million Americans in the ground, dead from COVID-19. Joe Biden was elected president in part on the promise of setting us on a science-driven course correction, but a little more than a year later, another half-million Americans were killed by the virus. What happened? In *The Fault in Our SARS*, evolutionary epidemiologist Rob Wallace catalogs the Biden administration's failures in controlling the outbreak. He also shows that, beyond matters of specific political persona or party, it was a decades-long structural decline that put profits ahead of people that gutted U.S. public health.

COVID-19 isn't just an American tragedy; countries around the world following the "profit-first" model failed their people. Global vaccination campaigns were bottled up by efforts to protect pharmaceutical companies' intellectual property rights. Economies were treated as somehow more real than the people and ecologies upon which they depend.

Wallace and an array of invited contributors aim to strip down the capitalist social psychology that in effect protected the SARS virus, proposing instead new approaches in health and ecology that appeal both to humanity's highest ideals and to the pragmatic changes we must make to survive COVID and the worst of the new diseases on the horizon.

**ROB WALLACE** is a co-founder of the Agroecology and Rural Economics Research Corps. He is author of *Big Farms Make Big Flu* and co-author of *Neoliberal Ebola*. He is also a member of Pandemic Research for the People and has consulted for the Centers for Disease Control and the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.

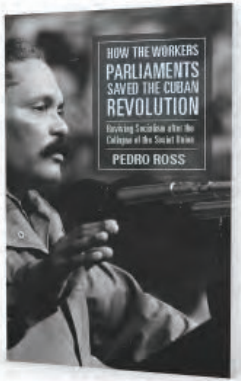

After the Soviet Union fell to pieces in the 1990s, Cuba embarked upon a remarkable collective effort to cope with its dire circumstances and escape the starvation, disease, death, and violence that often plague poor countries facing similar conditions. Not only did Cuba manage to evade collapse, it maintained its high life expectancy, low infant mortality, and universal access to healthcare and education, preserving many of the gains of the Revolution.

At the center of this collective effort were lifelong revolutionaries like Pedro Ross. As head of Cuba's labor federation throughout the "Special Period," Ross developed a nationwide series of "labor parliaments" that turned the country into an immense school of economics and politics. Over a 45-day span in 1993, women's rights activists, farmers' organizations, youth movements, and academic associations came together for tens of thousands of meetings, successfully restored the production cycle, and ultimately revolutionized nearly every aspect of life in Cuba. In this seminal account, Ross gives us an insider's view of a society mobilized from below, buttressing the Revolution when it was under maximum stress.

Beginning as a young construction worker in Cuba, **PEDRO ROSS** became a teacher during Cuba's great literacy campaigns of the 1960s, and came to serve three terms as General Secretary of Cuba's labor federation, the CTC (The Workers' Central Union of Cuba). Upon retirement, he was appointed Ambassador to Angola. Now in his eighties, he remains active in Cuba's ongoing Revolution.

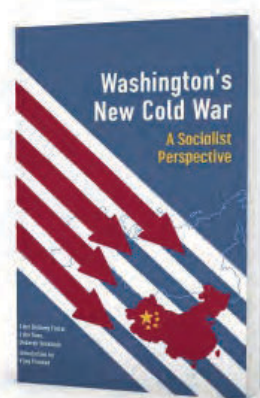
# Washington's New Cold War

As the American people delude themselves once more into thinking of the United States as a liberating force for peace in the world, *Washington's New Cold War* invites us, instead, to think for ourselves. Behind the scenes, plans to wage war have been laid, whether by proxy, as in Ukraine, or directly, against the U.S.'s old twentieth-century foes. The aim of this latest set of American military escapades remains the same as ever: maintenance of U.S. hegemony in the global financial system.

This cogent collaboration by three left intellectuals illustrates that while the Cold War against the Soviet Union ended, the "cold war" against the "enemies" of the United States did not. The authors provide evidence that the U.S. establishment has been willing to risk nuclear winter to hold onto economic primacy. They show that, while Russia and China can each be criticized, justifiably, for their violations of human life and dignity, neither on its own threatens the eruption of a Third World War and the end of the human race as we know it. *Washington's New Cold War* is an intelligent text that strengthens our struggle against the cynical machinations of the American military behemoth and its propaganda machine.

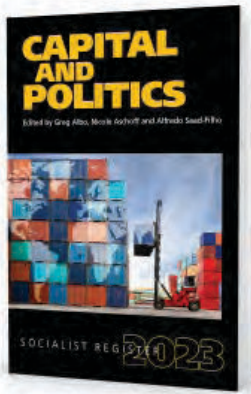

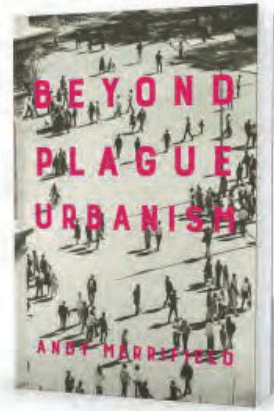


# Beyond Plague Urbanism

# The Hidden History of the Korean War

Proxy wars, it seems, are fought more openly than ever before—and yet one of the worst of these was suppressed and “forgotten,” even in its own time. At the height of the McCarthy era and the inception of the Cold War, the great journalist I. F. Stone released *The Hidden History of the Korean War*, a courageous work of investigative journalism. Unable to find a publisher, Stone’s chance meeting with Paul M. Sweezy and Leo Huberman—editors of the fledgling *Monthly Review* magazine—resulted in the birth of Monthly Review Press in 1952.

As the war spiraled to its conclusion, Stone closely analyzed openly available U.S. intelligence narratives on the war’s official start and the actions of key players. The result of his investigation was this controversial book that raised questions about the origin of the war, making the case that the U.S. government manipulated the United Nations, and that the U.S. military and South Korean oligarchy dragged out the war by sabotaging peace talks.

With a new introduction by Tim Beal and Greg Elich, *The Hidden History of the Korean War* remains a powerful exploration of the story behind the dominant historical narrative—one that remains as relevant as ever.

**I. F. STONE** (1907–1989) was an American journalist and publisher. After working at the *New York Post*, *The Nation* (as editor from 1940 to 1946), and *PM*, he started his own journal, *I. F. Stone’s Weekly*, in 1953. Stone also published more than a dozen books and was considered one of the most influential journalists of the postwar period. **TIM BEAL** is a retired New Zealand academic with a special interest in U.S. imperialism particularly with respect to Asia. **GREGORY ELICH** is a Korea Policy Institute associate and is on the Board of Directors of the Jasenovac Research Institute.

# The War Against the Commons

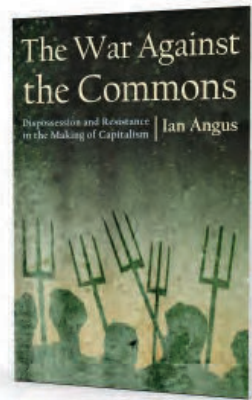
Dispossession and Resistance

For five centuries, the development of capitalism has been inextricably connected to the expropriation of working people from the land they depended on for subsistence. Through ruling-class assaults known as enclosures or clearances, shared common land became privately owned capital, and peasant farmers became propertyless laborers who could only survive by working for the owners of land or capital.

As Ian Angus shows, mass opposition to dispossession has never ceased. His dramatic account provides new insights into an opposition that ranged from stubborn noncompliance to open rebellion, including eyewitness accounts of campaigns in which thousands of protesters tore down fences and restored common access to pastures and forests. Such movements, he shows, led to the Diggers' call for a new society based on shared ownership and use of the land, an appeal that was more sophisticated and radical than anything else written before the 1800s.

This unique historical account of ruling-class robbery and poor people's resistance offers fresh insights and answers to key questions about the history of capitalism.

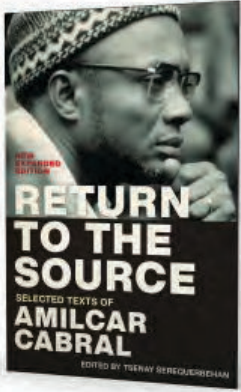

“For us,” said Amilcar Cabral, “freedom is an act of culture.” Guided by the concrete realities of his people, Cabral called for a process of “re-Africanization,” a return to the source. With a system of thought rooted in an African reading of Marx, Cabral was a deep-thinking revolutionary who applied the principles of decolonization as a dialectical task, and in so doing became one of the world’s most influential and effective theoreticians of anti-imperialist struggle. Cabral and his fellow Pan-African movement leaders catalyzed and fortified a militant wave of liberation struggles beginning in Angola, moving through Cabral’s homelands of Guinea Bissau and Cape Verde, and culminating in Mozambique. He translated abstract theories into agile praxis and in under just ten years steered the liberation of three-quarters of the countryside of Guinea Bissau from Portuguese colonial domination.

In this new, expanded edition, we have access to Cabral’s warm and humorous informal address to the Africa Information Service. We also revisit several of the major speeches he delivered during trips to the United States in the final years before his assassination in 1973.

**AMILCAR CABRAL** (1924–1973) was a Pan-African freedom fighter and anti-imperialist theorist. He was born in Bafatá, Guinea Bisseau, under Portuguese colonial dominion. He studied agronomy in Portugal alongside other African colonial subjects, who joined together to form student movements dedicated to opposing the ruling dictatorship of Portugal and to promoting the cause of independence for all Portuguese colonies in Africa. Upon his return to Africa in the 1950s, he managed, in under a decade, to lead Guinea Bissau toward near total independence before his assassination on January 20, 1973, by Portuguese agents. **TSENAY SEREQUEBERHAN** is a professor of philosophy at Morgan State University in Maryland.
